

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The information collected through the PIT Count is used to help guide community planning efforts—including federal funding decisions for homeless programs—and to measure New Bedford's progress towards ending homelessness.





Point-in-Time Count data is critical to demonstrating the need for resources, accurately measuring and identifying the needs of populations that are hardest to serve.









On the night of February 11, 2015, the PIT Count identified 437 homeless men, women and children in New Bedford of whom 50 were unsheltered, 162 were in emergency shelter and 225 were in transitional housing.

This represented a 28% overall increase from 2014.





By conducting this annual count, the city receives an important snapshot into the specific subpopulations most prevalent within the overall population of those experiencing homelessness. As a result, resources can be better targeted to ensure those in greatest need are getting the assistance they need to move out of homelessness.





# coc written standards

The HSPN adopted written standards detailing its responsibilities as a continuum of care with respect to implementing a system that meets the needs of those experiencing homelessness within the City of New Bedford.

## The written standards:

- Assist with the coordination of service delivery across the city and creates a basis for a coordinated entry system.
- Assist in assessing individuals/families consistently to determine program eligibility.
- Assist in administering programs fairly and methodically.
- Establish common performance measurements for all CoC components, and
- Provide the basis for monitoring all CoC and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funded projects.





## sister rose award

The Sister Rose Award was established by the HSPN in honor of its first recipient, sister Rose Ellen Gallogly, Executive Director of Market Ministries and one of the founding members of the HSPN.

## 2015 streetsheet released

Thanks to funding from United Way to print these materials, over 7,000 streetsheets were distributed throughout the community in three languages—English, Portuguese and Spanish—in 2015.

# encampments

The growing number of people residing in encampments within the city prompted significant attention during the summer of 2015. In response, the HSPN formed an Outreach Task Force to provide collaborative, compassionate, immediate assistance to folks living outside—and to begin relationship building and trust between partnering entities and those being served.





# funding

The New Bedford Continuum of Care was awarded \$1,944,951 in funding in 2015!

That funding provided critical dollars to renew the city's existing transitional and permanent housing programs.

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# partners: hud

This year the HSPN focused on the implementation of the priorities set forth in "Opening Doors," the nation's first comprehensive Federal strategy to prevent and end homelessness being particularly mindful of the importance of strategically approaching how it will end homelessness and beginning that work with ending veteran's homelessness and chronic homelessness.





# partners: soco

The South Coast Regional Network (SoCo) is one of ten regional networks across the Commonwealth working in bringing collaborative voices to the table with the fixed purpose of ending homelessness. SoCo includes the City of New Bedford within its catchment area.

In 2015, the HSPN actively participated in SoCo efforts to end veteran's homelessness and ensure HMIS and coordinated entry efforts were on target.





# rise up for homes

Rise Up is a collaborative campaign established by the HSPN designed to build community awareness and raise funds to meet the complex needs of individuals/families experiencing homelessness in New Bedford. It's purpose is more than just fundraising; it's about changing the narrative about homelessness, presenting facts and opportunity for conversation to create innovative solutions to the problem while ensuring everyone has a voice in this process.

An ambitious fundraising goal of \$100,000 was launched in October 2015 and will be ongoing through 2016.





# one homeless night...

In order to start the community conversation around homelessness in New Bedford, the Rise Up team held a community camp-out night on a frosty damp night in October.

With significant participation from the city's political leadership, its faith community and the media as well as several folks in the midst of homelessness joining in the campout and conversation, One Homeless Night was considered a huge success. Money was raised, connections were made, and an important dialogue in the city around poverty, need and homelessness began.





# coordinated intake

After over a year and a half of careful planning, strategic development, brainstorming and training sessions, the continuum's new coordinated intake system went live on December 1, 2015.

THE CALL (Coordinated Access to Local Links) was adopted as the centralized intake system across the three Bristol County continuums and its operational protocols were adopted by the HSPN.

# coordinated intake

The continuum's new CALL system consists of three components:

- Telephone entry into homeless systems and completion of a vulnerability index
- Placement in housing—either emergency, transitional or permanent or placement on a waiting list for housing within participating agencies
- Monitoring and evaluation to ensure efficacy of the process

Through the efforts of Rise Up and an appropriation by the city, cold weather shelter availability will be realized at PAACA until such time that the designated new cold weather shelter at Catholic Social Services is opened in 2016.
