





The HSPN's annual "Point In Time" count creating a census of those experiencing homelessness was conducted in a 24hr period beginning Wednesday, January 25, 2017.






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






On the night of January 25<sup>th</sup>, the PIT Count identified 352 homeless men, women and children in New Bedford of whom 49 were unsheltered and 303 were either in emergency shelters or transitional housing in the city.

The total of those unsheltered represents an 11% decrease from 2016's Point In Time count.







By conducting this annual count, the city also gets an important snapshot into the specific subpopulations most prevalent within the overall population of those experiencing homelessness.

As a result, resources can be better targeted to ensure those in greatest need are getting the assistance they need to move out of homelessness.

# elderly homelessness








#### mental health issues

The HSPN membership began a difficult conversation around the realities of mental health issues that have become one of the most prevalent issues facing those experiencing homelessness within the New Bedford CoC.





#### schools and homelessness

Julie Mador, Registrar with the New Bedford Public Schools (NBPS) and member of the HSPN Executive Committee, presents information to the HSPN membership each month addressing homelessness within the school system and the extent to which they are seeing students experiencing varying forms of homelessness.

By April of 2017 a total of 900 students enrolled in the NBPS system were identified as experiencing some form of homelessness, a number that would continue rising through the end of the school year; in June 2017 it hit 1,063—the largest number ever seen qualifying under McKinney Vento and significantly in excess of 2016's total of 675.





#### encampments

As part of its efforts in addressing encampments in New Bedford's CoC, the city—in conjunction with non-profit and other public agencies—developed Homeless Emergency Assistance Response Team (HEART) protocols.



These guidelines address encampments in the city and articulates the steps the city's neighborhood task force will take with the initial response team that includes police, fire, PAACA, Catholic Social Services, the health department and InterChurch Council.



#### streetsheet.2017

A 2017 edition of the city's "StreetSheet" detailing resources throughout the city for those experiencing homelessness or in need of supportive services was published.

Thanks to funding from United Way and the unbelievable support of Trinity Press, roughly 9,000 StreetSheets were distributed throughout the community in three languages— **English, Portuguese and Spanish.**




#### mental health forum

Over sixty people attended the HSPN meeting in May at SouthCoast Behavioral Health where a panel of experts addressed the intersection of homelessness and mental health.




## youth count

2017 marked the fourth annual statewide youth count conducted May 1<sup>st</sup> – May 14<sup>th</sup>. Locally surveys were provided to those identified as youth experiencing homelessness and those within the New Bedford Public School System, Bristol Community College and St. Killian's shelter for unaccompanied youth. A total of 350 surveys were completed in New Bedford, only ten of whom were classified as homeless.







#### nofa

Each year we know that the federal NOFA—Notice of Funding Availability—from HUD will be issued to provide an opportunity for local CoC's like the HSPN to articulate their strategies for ending homelessness and the extent to which they are achieving success towards that goal.

The 2017 NOFA arrived during the summer and proved to be an extremely competitive undertaking. Results are anticipated by the end of 2017 or early 2018.





#### strategic planning

The City of New Bedford's Department of Planning, Housing & Community Development worked with the HSPN Executive **Committee and consultant TAC (The Technical Assistance** Collaborative) in developing and publishing a two year strategic plan for the Continuum.

# funding

The New Bedford Continuum of Care application was submitted in September of 2017.

The CoC was awarded just under \$1.7 million in funding in 2016 to renew the city's existing permanent housing programs; as of this presentation, no announcement has yet been made for the most recent round.




#### nb connect.2017

It is anticipated this important resource event along with the important dialogue in the city around poverty, need and homelessness will continue with future NB Connect events in the coming years.






#### sister rose award

David Lima of the InterChurch Council of Greater New


Bedford in recognition of his enormous contributions, both personal and professional, to serving those experiencing homeless in the City of New Bedford.






#### hurricane maria & puerto rican displacement

While the 2017 hurricane season wreaked devastation in a number of locations, it was Puerto Rico that was particularly hard hit by the affects of the storm, leading thousands to flee the island. As of December 2017, over 400 individuals from P.R. had sought services and/or housing in New Bedford. The United Way's Family Resource & Development Center led the outreach efforts and the HSPN was involved in developing a revised StreetSheet specific to the needs of those coming post-storm.






#### second year of coordinated entry

The continuum's new coordinated intake system went live on December 1, 2015 and has now reached the two year mark.

THE CALL (Coordinated Access to Local Links) was adopted as the centralized intake system across the three Bristol County continuums and its operational protocols were adopted by the HSPN.

Department of Planning, Housing & Community
Development staff along with Catholic Social Services (CALL staff) are now working with HUD consultants on upgrading the system to ensure compliance with the new HUD required standards effective January 23, 2018.






#### cold weather overflow shelter

Once again the overflow shelter was activated through the winter months, providing overnight shelter to over 580 guests. Rise Up's contribution of \$10,425 along with the City's own allocation and the amazing work of volunteers and staff provided valuable funding needed to ensure the shelter's operation.

Through the efforts of Rise Up and an appropriation by the city, extreme weather overflow shelter availability will be available during the winter of 2017-2018.





#### partners: soco

The South Coast Regional Network (SoCo) is one of ten regional networks across the Commonwealth working in bringing collaborative voices to the table with the fixed purpose of ending homelessness. SoCo includes the City of New Bedford within its catchment area.







#### partners: rise up for homes

Rise Up is a collaborative campaign established by the HSPN designed to build community awareness and raise funds to meet the complex needs of individuals/families experiencing homelessness in New Bedford. It's purpose is more than just fundraising; it's about changing the narrative about homelessness, presenting facts and opportunity for conversation to create innovative solutions to the problem while ensuring everyone has a voice in this process.

Since May 2017, Rise Up had raised over \$5,400; as of December 18, 2017, it's fund balance was just under \$19,000.





# partners: regional partnership meeting

Members of the New Bedford HSPN participated in the first Southeastern Regional McKinney-Vento Partnership Meeting in September hosted by the NB Public Schools. This meeting brought together local McKinney Vento liaisons with mainstream resource providers and Continuum representatives.
